#### SANDY DONSKY

She also developed and implemented the first Singles Division of the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas named New Dimensions, now known as YAD. A past member of the National Young Leadership Cabinet and National Women's Cabinet, Sandy was awarded the Bess Nathan Young Leadership Award and the National Women's Philanthropy International Lion of Judah Kipnis-Wilson/Friedland Award. Through the Federation, Sandy has traveled on Missions to Poland, Romania and Israel to broaden her understanding of the Jewish community worldwide.

Sandy also serves on The Legacy Senior Community Board of Trustees, Executive Committee and the Capital Campaign Committee, AJC Board of Directors and is incoming VP Co-Chair for Development and Congregation Shearith Israel Board of Directors. Her other passions include community service projects with her Ebby Halliday Real Estate office, helping the homeless and feeding the needy through The North Texas Food Bank. #### **BILL FINKELSTEIN**

Although Bill Finkelstein has many accomplishments that should be noted, the most unique one, perhaps, was his stint as Camp Cook for the Texas Cowboys at U.T. in 1970! Having gained recognition from this, Bill went on to serve in leadership positions at UT and received academic honors at Baylor School of Law, followed by a clerkship at the Supreme Court of Texas. His 43-year law career has taken him from Hughes & Luce to Dykema Cox Smith where he heads the Dallas office

Bill's service to the Jewish community includes UJA Young Leadership Cabinet, Akiba Academy, Dallas Kosher, Forest Lane Synagogue (Chabad), Mount Zion United Jewish Cemetery and TTI Annual Dinner. Most recently, he served as co-chair of the 2016 Israel Bonds Event and is a frequent High Holiday Bond Appeal speaker.

A Pacesetter at the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas, Bill has chaired the Lawyers' Division and Cardozo Society, has been a Pacesetter Division solicitor and was co-chairman of the \$11.25-million 2009 Annual Campaign. In 2011, he received both the Campaigner of the Year Award and Cardozo Member of the Year Award (now named for him). He originated the Shofar Society and was a member of the Board of Directors in 2012–2014. Bill participated in the 1987 Mission to Washington for Soviet Jewry, the 1995 Minyan Mission (Bus Captain), 2004 Executive Mission, and the 2009 Community Mission (Leader).

Among all his accomplishments, Bill is most proud of his 44-year marriage to Jeri Goldberg Finkelstein, his three daughters Robin Stone, Lisa Sadoughi and Shana Bygott-Webb, their spouses, and his eight grandchildren. On his horizon, he sees travel, skeet shooting, single malt whiskey tastings, and looks forward to future retirement. And perhaps another stint as "Camp Cook"? Glatt Kosher, of course.

## I. ZESMER YOUNG LEADERSHIP AWARD



#### **AVI EDWARDS**

Born in Brown Deer, Wisconsin, Avi was aware of his Jewish roots and involved in his Jewish community from a young age. He attended the Milwaukee Jewish Day School which provided him with a solid foundation of Hebrew and Judaica before his family moved to Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he attended Talmud Torah of Minneapolis, Camp Hertzl and then Camp Ramah in Wisconsin.

We are proud of the work we do on behalf of so many and invite you to see some of the highlights from the year.

#### **ANNUAL CAMPAIGN**

The Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas's Annual Campaign raises more than \$10 million dollars every year to provide the basic infrastructure that supports our local and global Jewish community. Core campaign funds are gifts to the Jewish Federation for allocations among our community partner agencies, Israel and overseas and Federation programs and administration. By allocating your philanthropic dollars to ensure the greatest impact, your Jewish Federation has earned a reputation as a trusted, effective charity that makes a real difference in our community and around the world.

#### **FEDERATION AFFINITY GROUPS**

This year's Lion/Pomegranate
Event took place at Cantoni,
one of Federation's Corporate
Sponsors, on December 8. Author,
television host, public speaker, and
non-profit executive, Alison Lebovitz
from Chattanooga, Tennessee was
the keynote speaker. Alison not only
inspired and moved Dallas' most
influential ladies with both laughter



and tears, but as a strong leader in the National Federation system, it was no surprise she was able to close the night with a **26% card for card** increase.

On December 10, the Real Estate Division held a breakfast with Scott Beck presenting on the Dallas Midtown project.



The Cardozo Society, the Jewish Federation's giving society for attorneys who give \$2,000 or more to the Federation's Annual Campaign, hosted their annual networking cocktail event at the home of Robin and Evan Stone.

23 new members were honored at the event attended by more than 70 members.



The Maimonides Society, the giving society for doctors who give \$2,000 or more to the Federation's Annual Campaign, held a continuing education program with Dr. Mike Emmett who led a presentation on Nazi physicians and the Holocaust.



The General Business and Finance Division held a networking breakfast with a panel of private equity professionals led by Jim Tolbert, General Campaign co-chair.



On March 29, 35 Lions and Poms participated in the second Lunch & Learn of our series. Guest speaker Zsuzsa Fritz, Director, Balint Jewish Community Center, Budapest, Hungary Educational Director, Szarvas Camp discussed the revival taking place in Hungary, which is currently home to 120,000 Jews and is the largest Jewish community in central Europe.



More than 325 volunteers from across greater Dallas took part in Good Deeds Day on April 10, an international day of service with more than 1,000,000 individuals around the world working to make a difference. The Federation's Good Deeds Day included Super Sunday, the Young Adult Division (YAD) Mitzvah Day, Federation's Jewish Women's Philanthropy Center's (JWPC) Younger Set and collaboration with J-Serve for teens.



JWPC's Younger Set's "Let's Get Personal" program held on April 12 featured Ruth Lurie, Mary Pat Higgins, Gail Herson and Dr. Daniel Achtman and Dr. Carmine McConnell who covered topics including breathing and meditation, dermatology, finding your passion and Jewish spirituality.



On Wednesday, April 13, more than 50 young adults from across greater Dallas attended Federation's YAD (Young Adult Division)
Meet and Greet Happy Hour at HG Sply Co. The Happy Hour introduced the newest members of the YAD Team and offered networking opportunities.



January 31, 2016 is an evening that will go down in Federation history!

ONE Night with Seth Meyers
was Federation Board Chair Dan
Prescott's vision of combining the traditional Men's and Women's
Events into ONE evening of community, connection and fun.
Chaired by Candy and Ike Brown,
Lisa and Neil Goldberg, and Laurie



and Todd Platt, the evening was one of the largest fundraising events in recent history for the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas. It was an incredible night of entertainment and philanthropy that highlighted the work of the Jewish Federation and raised more than \$1.5 million to support each of the Federation's 64 partner agencies and initiatives.

#### ISRAEL AND OVERSEAS

The Federation's Israel & Overseas Department builds local community connection to Israel, raises and implements funds, helps implement designated overseas projects, and participates in the collective support for world Jewry.

It has been an active and exciting year with Federation's Israel & Overseas Department! With a partner organization of our Partnership Program, Aharai!, we have worked supporting them in cultivating youth leadership and enhancing social activism among youth from poverty-stricken neighborhoods in our partnership region of the Western



Galilee. The Federation supports Aharai!'s pre-military preparation groups in these cities in our region: Acre, Maalot, Shlomi, Nayariya as well as the "Gal" Pre-Army Academy Leadership College in Akko. A delegation from Aharai! visited Dallas this May for Israel Independence Day and led activities at a few of the Jewish day schools in Dallas and connected with Moishe House and leaders from Federation's Cabinet program.

#### **VISITS TO ISRAEL**

More than **85 individuals** have visited **Dallas's Partnership Region** this year on individual and group trips. They have experienced some of the best sites in the region and learned about the work of our community across the region. An additional **15 individuals** have travelled globally with Federation, visiting **Argentina**, **Budapest**, and **Peru**.

#### COMMUNITY IMPACT GRANTS

This year, the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas awarded 18 Community Impact Grants to our partner agencies for programs that address new or unmet needs in order to have a positive impact on the Dallas Jewish community.

#### Some highlights include:

- Through a Community Impact Grant, the Center for Jewish Education
  convened 415 early childhood and day school educators for a session
  on the Conscious Discipline technique at their community-wide day of
  learning. In addition to the session for educators, the grant also included
  a session for the parents, so that they could become familiar with the
  philosophy being implemented in our schools. More than 100 parents
  attended the evening session.
- Through our assistance, the Aaron Family JCC utilized grant funding
  for its Seniors program and provided 4,680 senior trips to the JCC
  to those seniors who otherwise would be homebound and unable to
  have social connections. Our support enabled the J to grow its Senior
  membership to more than 450. This year, programming increased to
  focus on wellness including classes on chair yoga, art class, line dancing,
  immunity boosting restorative yoga, and more.
- The Federation partnered with Jewish Family Service on their At-Risk
  Youth Prevention and Intervention initiative providing individual and
  family assessment, crisis intervention, and ongoing counseling/mental
  health services. 99 teens have been served through the program this
  year. The initiative also offered a series of workshops for teens focused
  on body image and self-esteem, social communication skills, crisis
  management, how to talk to parents about challenges teens are facing,
  and more
- The Federation awarded Community Impact Grants to our partner
  Hillels (Hillels of North Texas, Texas Hillel, and Texas A&M Hillel) to
  engage more than 1,500 Jewish college students on their campuses.
  Students have been learning about Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions
  (BDS), tikkun olam programs (community service), celebration of
  Shabbat and Jewish holidays, and more. Each of the students engaged
  has maintained a strong connection to Jewish life on campus.

#### **OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT GRANTS**

In addition to the Community Impact Grants, which are awarded to existing partner agencies, the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas awarded 11 Outreach & Engagement Grants to non-partner Jewish organizations for their engagement work across the community. Efforts ranged from a sukkah building workshop at Home Depot last fall to college students at UT Dallas and SMU coming together to celebrate Shabbat and holidays, and young family outreach in Allen, McKinney, and Frisco.

We appreciate the work of each of these organizations to connect more people with our Jewish community. As an example, through the Outreach & Engagement Grants, Temple Emanu-El hosted Guide training and matching events for **Sh'ma Emanu-El**, their small groups initiative, with more than **120 members** attending. Following those events, some Sh'ma Emanu-El groups were expanded and **10 new groups** were formed.

## Combatting BDS

More than 60 Dallas area Jewish high school students attended Ready for College: Navigating Jewish and Pro-Israel Life on Campus on Sunday, May 1 at Studio Movie Grill. The event sought to educate students about the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement and other anti-



Israel movements on American college campuses, and to help prepare them to be confidently Jewish and pro-Israel at college. The program included a screening of *Crossing the Line 2*, a short film about BDS, and a panel discussion with pro-Israel Jewish student activists sharing their own experiences defending Israel and Jewish life on campus. The event fits into the greater Combatting BDS Federation initiative, making Dallas one of the first Federations in the nation to create a committee focusing on this issue.

#### 4th Annual Interfaith Seder

The JCRC brought more than 400 people together for its 4th Annual Interfaith Seder. Co-led by Rabbi David Stern, Senior Rabbi of Temple Emanu-El and Reverend Jan DeVries, General Presbyter of Grace Presbytery, this year's Seder offered those in attendance the opportunity to examine the universal value of



welcoming the stranger. Fifteen faith leaders, representing more than 10 faith and denominations participated in the Seder. Feedback was outstanding, and the event served as an important opportunity to teach others about our Jewish values and to strengthen relationships between the Jewish and non-Jewish communities.

#### Earned Income Tax Credit

More than 225 civic and faith leaders from both Jewish and non-Jewish communities across the Greater Dallas area assembled at the Martin Luther King Jr. Recreation Center on Thursday, December 10 for Promoting a Healthy Dallas: The



Importance of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), presented by the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) of the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas, as part of Anti-Poverty Coalition of Greater Dallas. The event served as the kick-off for a new marketing initiative promoting use of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) as a means for alleviating poverty and promoting economic vitality in the greater Dallas area. In 2015, the JCRC led the Anti-Poverty Coalition's successful effort to urge the Dallas City Council to release \$200,000 to support volunteer income tax assistance in the greater Dallas area.

#### Iran Nuclear Deal Series

In the aftermath of the Iran Nuclear Deal, the JCRC hosted a series of speakers throughout the fall of 2015 to examine the Deal and its implications for Israel, the Middle East and the United States. The first program featured two American journalists discussing the implications of the Deal for American



politics. The second program featured Martin Raffel, former Senior Vice President at the Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA), and discussed how to move forward as a united Jewish community after the Deal. The third and final program featured James Jeffrey, former Deputy National Security Advisor and former Ambassador to Iraq, Turkey and Albania, and discussed the Deal's impact on the future of relations between Israel and its neighbors in the Middle East.

## Education Initiative

The JCRC Education Initiative is committed to providing Jewish parents with children in public school with the resources and support to enable them to have a successful experience being Jewish in public school. In an effort to achieve this goal, the JCRC hosted programs for parents in Richardson Independent



School District, Plano Independent School District, and Frisco Independent School District. Speakers included the highest level of decision makers in the District, including the respective School Board Presidents and in some cases the Superintendent of the School District. These events brought Jewish parents together to get to know one another, learn about the resources available through the JCRC Education Initiative, and meet the leaders and decision makers in each of these school districts.

# Institute of Advanced Teacher Education

The CJE's Institute of Advanced
Teacher Education offers teacher
workshops, Yom Limud (a day
of learning, appreciation, and
networking for the teachers),
and other Jewish education
opportunities focused on
professional development. Teachers



receive cash stipends for completing a minimum of 12 hours of course study. On January 4, 2016, 415 early childhood and day school educators had an opportunity to learn with Conscious Discipline Associate Kim Hughes at their community-wide day of learning. In addition, 100 parents attended an evening session on the same topic so they could learn the philosophy as well. This project was funded by a Community Impact Grant of the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas. 20 teacher workshops were offered this year. 43 teachers attended more than 12 hours of workshops and earned a \$100 stipend from the CJE.

## LearningFest

Since 2008, **LearningFest** has been a signature annual event, providing the Dallas Jewish community an opportunity to sample an educational menu that offers varied personalities, teaching styles, and content comprised of the **rich educational resources** that are available in Dallas. In 2015, more



than **600 people participated** in our LearningFest weekend of activities. Additionally, our LearningFest series continues throughout the year at the Mankoff Center for Jewish Learning featuring scholars from our community's finest universities and academic institutions. These evening programs usually draw more than **100 participants**. This year, **LearningFest** will take place on **November 6, 2016** at the Aaron Family Jewish Community Center.

#### Jewish Studies Professors

The goal of the newly formed North Texas Council of Jewish Studies Professors is to provide an opportunity for area professors to come together, collaborate and possibly coordinate programs.

The CJE has compiled a directory featuring 34 professors and academicians from area universities.



and institutions which include Southern Methodist University, University of Texas at Dallas, University of North Texas, University of Dallas, as well as Texas Christian University and the Dallas Holocaust Museum/Center for Education and Tolerance. The directory was compiled to provide area university professors with a networking tool and serve as a resource guide for the Dallas area Jewish Community to connect with Jewish studies professors associated with universities and academics to speak at their various institutions.

## PJ Library

PJ Library Dallas touches the lives of more than 1,700 Jewish families throughout the greater Dallas community. Close to 2,000 PJ Library books are sent out each month to children ages six months through eight years old, here in Dallas. More than 25 meaningful programs enriched both the lives of children and adults this past year.



These programs help to strengthen Jewish knowledge and build community. Jewish schools and organizations feel the impact of PJ Library through collaboration and partner programs which are offered as part of our monthly programming. Dallas continues to grow its newest chapter of the PJ Library program, PJ Our Way. This program for 9-to-11-year-olds is Dallas' fastest growing PJ Program and puts kids in the driver's seat by letting them select the book they receive each month. PJ Library is made possible by the Harold Grinspoon Foundation and through a generous grant from the Mankoff Family Foundation.

## Teen Community Event

On Saturday March 26, almost 200 teens in grades 8-12 gathered together for an evening of laughter with Comedy Mind Reader Eric Dittelman. Sponsored by a Federation Outreach and Engagement grant, several youth groups joined together to plan the event which also included carnival games, havdallah, and a session with an improy group.



#### The Tycher Library

The Tycher Library is a Jewish content library serving more than 1,000 patrons. It is located on the second floor of the Aaron Family JCC and offers books. DVDs. audiobooks, and public computer stations with free printing. It holds many community-wide engagement programs throughout the year including its signature event, the Community Read, where patrons come together to meet and hear an author whose book the entire community has joined to read. The Tycher Library continues to grow its collection and provides lifelong Jewish learning opportunities through its quality programming and resources. Regular programs like the





Morning Book Club, Fiction Flicks and the newest addition, the BYOBook Club, provide outlets for conversation. This year's Community Read author event with author Nomi Eve was featured on KERA's Think with Krys Boyd and had more than 180 attendees including a number of local book clubs. Alison Pick, the Tycher Library's Spring Read author remarked about her visit, "I was humbled and honored to have my memoir Between Gods selected for the Tycher Library Spring Read. It was such a pleasure to travel to Dallas, to meet many wonderful readers, and to share my story with such a smart and literary audience."
